From The Vicar

ecently I was drawn to two unexpected matters. The first was an email which was about "How do we live a Christian life?" This question was based on a book written by Dorothy C. Bass, a prolific author and practical theologian, entitled 'Practicing Our Faith' which was an insightful and helpful



framework for thinking about Christian faith and life. 'Practicing Our Faith' makes a compelling case for what remains a fundamental question of our time: "How do we live a Christian life?"

What are Christian practices? Christian practices are things we do within a Christian community (or maybe even outside the Christian community). They are shared patterns of activity. In and through them, life together takes shape over time — in response to and in the light of God, as known in Jesus Christ. Woven together, these practices form a way of life. Ultimately, Christian practices can be understood not as tasks but as gifts. It is important to note that within each practice, thinking and doing are inextricably knit together — see https://practicingourfaith.org/wp-content/uploads/2022/03/What-is-a-practice2.pdf for further information.

Bass identified 12 Christian practices as we live a Christian life. A short description of these practices is listed below:

- Honouring the Body the practice born of the confidence that our bodies are made in the image of God's own goodness
- Hospitality recognising the need for shelter is a fundamental human need
- 3. **Household Economics** the Christian practice of household economics calls on us to manage our private

- homes for the well-being and livelihood of this planet we all share
- 4. **Saying Yes and Saying No** tough decisions and persistent effort are required of those who seek lives that are whole and holy
- 5. **Keeping Sabbath** the practice of keeping Sabbath helps us to resist the tyranny of too much or too little work
- 6. **Testimony** in testimony, people speak truthfully about what they have experienced and seen, offering it to the community for the edification of all
- 7. **Singing Our Lives** what we sing and how we sing reveals much of who we are, and entering another's song and music-making provides a gateway into their world, which might be much different from our own
- 8. **Dying Well** dying well embraces both lament and hope, and both a sense of divine judgment and an awareness of divine mercy
- 9. **Healing** the practice of healing is a central part of the reconciling activity of God in the world;
- 10. Forgiveness forgiveness involves us in a whole way of life that is shaped by an ever-deepening friendship with God and with other people
- 11. Shaping Communities This practice takes on life through roles and rituals, laws and agreements — indeed, through the whole assortment of shared commitments and institutional arrangements that order common life
- 12. **Discernment** the intentional practice by which a community or an individual seeks, recognizes, and intentionally takes part in the activity of God in concrete situations.

Of course, there could be others practices too (for example, peacemaking). As we reflect on how to live a Christian life in today's world, what practices listed above do you believe need your attention? Obviously, I can't explain the details of each practice in this short article. Therefore, before making your decision, it would be advisable to read about these practices in: https://practicingourfaith.org/practices/


There will be only one service on this Sunday, please save the date and come to the 9.30am service for this special occasion. Morning tea will be served after the service.

Parishioners at St John's Bentleigh recently celebrated the unveiling of a new entrance, as well as an upgraded kitchen, stage and flooring. Since 2020, members of the church arranged for the removal of asbestos in the church and hall, upgraded the toilets, ceiling, lighting, windows and sound equipment.

The renovations had made the space very welcoming to the community, vicar -in-charge Reverend Santa Packianathan said.

He said he hoped it would lead more people to come to church.

"It's not a frightening place, it's a safe place to be," he said.

The building works for the latest set of renovations at St John's Bentleigh began in 2020 but faced a number of setbacks due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

Mr Packianathan said the parish's former incumbent, the Reverend Dr David Powys, was an instrumental part of starting the renovation process. The congregation also managed to raise \$130,000 to fund the upgrades through a series of events including a high tea, art show and talent night.

As part of the upgrade, the church hall was also named Pickford Hall. Mr Packianathan said that the late Tom and Marj Pickford had been core long-term members of the church community and the parish council wished to recognise them by renaming the hall in their honour.

Archbishop of Melbourne the Most Reverend Philip Freier attended the opening event on 21 August and unveiled the new hall name.
