The St. John's mosaics



Nimbus—a circle of light surrounding the head with three rays, suggesting the presence of the three Persons of God, Father, Son and Holy Ghost, in our thinking.



<u>Scales</u>—represent the unjust trial of Jesus prior to the crucifixion. In the Old Testament, the scales were used as a symbol of God's justice



<u>Crown of leaves</u>—the crown of leaves or flowers which formed the prize at the ancient Greek Games has become associated with the idea of the Victory of Christ over evil. A circle also suggests the eternal nature of God.



Crosses took many forms in the ancient world. This is a variation of the *Tau Cross*—named because of its likeness to the Greek letter 'tau', which became our English form of 'T'



<u>The Latin Cross</u>—this was the traditional shape of the cross on which Christ died. It has become a reminder for all Christians of Christ's sacrifice for us and His victory over sin



<u>The Anchor Cross</u>—this was used as a disguised cross by the persecuted Christians in the catacombs of Rome. Its origin was their confidence in the reliability of God.



<u>Yod</u>—in the centre is the Hebrew letter Yod, which is the first letter of the Hebrew word for God. The triangle represents the three Persons in one God.

The St. John's mosaics



<u>The fish</u>—Another disguised sign which the persecuted Christians used in the catacombs of Rome. The letters in the Greek word for 'fish' were also the first letters for the words 'Jesus Christ, Son of God, Saviour'.



One of the ways of writing the Greek letters *Chi Rho*, equivalent to the English letters Ch and R. These are the first two letters of the Greek word for Christ.



<u>The Epiphany Star</u>. A symbol of hope, reminding us of the journey of the Magi to find a Saviour.



<u>INRI</u>—These letters were placed on the head of the cross on which Jesus was crucified. They stand for the Latin words, 'Jesus Nazarenus Rex Iudacorum', meaning, 'Jesus of Nazareth, King of the Jews'.



<u>IHS</u>—these letters stand for the first three letters of the Greek word for Jesus.



<u>Alpha and Omega</u>—These are the first and last letters of the Greek alphabet, reminding us Christ is the Beginning and the Ending of all things.

From the Vicar



elcome to the July/August 2023 issue of *St. John's News*. This issue includes a record of two important services in the life of this parish; the confirmation service and baptism service held on 18th and 25th June respectively. Although many services of this nature have been held in St. John's before, both of these are the first for me in this parish.

Other articles in this issue are about two of our locum musicians. It is planned that the contribution of two other locum musicians will be included in the next issue of St.

John's News. It is great to witness and listen to the different organ playing styles of the locum musicians when the organ is played on Sunday. My thanks to all locum musicians in their ongoing support of ministry in this parish, especially as the parish is continuing in our search for a permanent Parish Musician (see advert below).

Since the publication of the previous St. John's News, (May 2023), much of my thinking has been about the "Leading your church into growth" (LYCiG) programme. The parish steering committee (or the 'cockpit crew' - a LYCiG term) has been established. Members are Eleanor Newcombe (People's Warden),

established. Members are Eleanor Newcombe (People's Warden), Glynis Rose (Vicar's Warden), Terry Nisbet (Parish authorised lay minister) and myself.

One of the initiatives from the cockpit crew was the installation of the book exchange cupboard (pictured on the right) near the Community Garden (along Centre Road). There are also plans to modify the existing signboard (cnr. Centre and Tucker Roads) to include cubicles for parish leaflets for the members of the community to collect as they walk past. I am also encouraged by the number of people attending the weekly 'Craft-Cuppa-Chat,' the monthly 'Messy Church' service and other initiatives to reach out to the community.

During winter, we have begun serving 'raisin toast' and 'soup with bread' after the Sunday 8.30AM and IOAM worship services respectively. These initiatives are practice runs for the future when the parish would be able to provide a simple hot meal at least once a week for those in our community who cannot afford a meal. Please continue to keep this matter in your prayer.s All these named initiatives and many others would not be possible without the assistance of the many lay ministers of the parish and the grace of God. I acknowledge that these are still early days and I pray that the momentum will continue to increase over time so that St. John's will see numerical growth, spiritual growth and missional growth.

As parishioners of St. John's Bentleigh, you are in effect 'ministers' of this parish for God's work anywhere you are. If you are wondering how you could assist/participate in the ministries of God through this parish, please speak to anyone of the parish 'cockpit crew.' We look forward to speaking with you.

A blast from the past! Pt. 1

ISTHIS FATE?

Most of us would answer NO; because we live in a Christianised society where we understand that people bring suffering and war on themselves by greed, selfishness, ignorance, jealousy, etc. These motivating desires are to be found on both sides in any quarrel!

If so, how can we actively campaign against war and its futile waste – its holocaust of human life and family love? The question is highlighted by demonstrative action in Canberra and Sydney. Is this the answer?

Before replying. Let us examine what we are already committed to. If we are baptised members of the Church of God (statistics say 70% are) then we are enlisted in God's army with the solemn words, "signed with the sign of the cross in token that hereafter we shall not be ashamed to confess the faith of Christ crucified and manfully to fight under his banner, against sin, the world and the devil; and to continue Christ's faithful soldiers and servants unto our lives end."

Morris West's book, 'The Ambassador', set in bold relief the complexity of the Vietnam situation and our western inadequacy to cope with the psychological and ideological pressures both in Saigon and throughout South East Asia. Few of us are qualified to be Generals and we certainly never will be unless we prove ourselves first as privates! A soldier's job in the army is to obey orders. Are we really serious about bringing peace on earth and goodwill to men?

Our orders as soldiers in Christ's army are set out clearly in our church membership cards.


- To follow the example of Christ in home and daily life, and to bear personal witness to Him.
- To be regular in private prayer day by day.
- To read the Bible carefully.
- To come to Church every Sunday.

- To receive Holy Communion faithfully and regularly.
- To give personal service to Church, neighbours and the community.
- To give money for the work of parish and diocese and for the work of the Church at home and overseas.
- To uphold the standard of marriage entrusted by Christ to his Church.
- To care that children are brought up to love and serve the Lord.

These are not optional extras. They are the very commands of our superior officer. He may not issue them like a sergeant-major but he proved his sincerity by dying rather than disobey his own orders.

It is also dangerous to move into front-line action until we have proved our competence in training camp. Don't let us allow the Vietnam situation to become fatal when by obedience in the Christian ranks we have the greatest power on earth at our disposal.

ARE YOU ACCIDENT PRONE?

Researchers use to think that certain people suffered frequent injuries because they were 'accident prone'. Today, they're not so sure!

An American Medical Association committee has reported that some persons live under more or less permanent emotional stress that often provokes aggressive or depressive reactions, and that they are unaware of the increased likelihood of an accident.

Psychiatrists say there is a link between overcrowded cities, mental tension and motor accidents. It has been shown that noise in factories lowers work efficiency with a result that people make mistakes. Noise and turmoil – whether in our minds or in the circumstances or influences that surround us – lead to 'accidents'.

In the same way the noise and turmoil of the spiritual battle have their effects on the well-being of our souls. And we can no more escape them than we can the stress of modern living. What we can do is set aside regularly a time for refreshment – a time to be quiet with God, to pray and to read His Word.

Fifteen years ago, Bee - a troubled little girl - was removed from her home for her own safety. She was sad, scared and withdrawn. That is until Marion, her Kids Hope mentor, turned up.

Marion thought some painting would brighten up Bee's day. However, Bee didn't touch the colour. Instead, she covered her canvas completely in grey.

With each passing week Bee began to find confidence and joy. She felt cared for and wanted, and her beauty and talent began to shine through. She began to add colour to her painting. It started with clouds, then a few people, an umbrella and one hand reaching in from the side, helping her hold the umbrella. This, she said, was Marion.



Bee asked Marion why she kept coming back every week, and Marion told her that she meant more to her than "all the gold in the world." Bee was touched and added a golden lining to the clouds in her painting. At her grade six graduation, Marion gave Bee a bracelet inscribed with: "You mean more than all the gold in the world."

Twelve years passed and Marion prayed that she would one day find Bee. Two days later, Marion took her pet to a vet clinic. There at reception sat a young woman with eyes remarkably like Bee's. Marion asked, "Bee is that you?" Bee looked at her with confusion.

When Marion removed her mask, Bee stood up and holding back tears said, "I've been looking for you! I still wear the bracelet you gave me!" There she was, all grown up, 23 years old, mature, confident, working at a vet clinic and still wearing the bracelet!

Our locum musicians

Since the departure of our regular parish musician, the Revd Alex Scutt last year, we have been fortunate enough to have the assistance of local and very talented organists.

Let's introduce two of them to you here.

Allan Clark

1959 - 1963 piano playing skills upgraded and learned the Pipe Organ in Williamstown Congregational Church building on a Tracker Action Pipe Organ.

(That means mechanical, not electrical but it had an electrical air

pump.)

1962 - 1967 Organist at Newport Baptist Church (two manual Harmonium with electric air pump also played an Electronic organ subsequently)

1968 - 1975 - main Organist at Altona Methodist Church (Pedal Harmonium followed by an Electronic organ).

1968 - played Pipe Organ at Williamstown Presbyterian Church for 9 months.

1976 - 1980 Organist at Coburg Methodist till 1977 then Uniting Church (Pipe Organ).

1981 - 1985 main Organist at Tennant Creek Uniting Church Northern Territory. (Pedal Harmonium subsequently Electronic organ).

1986 - 2002 Organist Narrabri Uniting Church, N.S.W. (Electronic organ also piano).


2004 - Present - rotating organist/keyboard with others who only play keyboard at BENTLEIGH Uniting Church (and other places as needed).

Simon Sheridan Simon has frequently played at St John's Bentleigh, since first being invited as guest organist for the late carols service on Christmas Eve, 2019. He is a local resident and a regular organist at nearby Ormond Anglican Church, where he was mentored by the church's former (now retired) organist who had played there for 30

years prior to the pandemic.

Simon is a classically trained pianist who also plays at weddings and other special occasions. He has a background in public health and works in the medical equipment sector. Simon believes that music is a powerful ingredient for worship: "Music can allow us to express things and navigate feelings beyond language.. sometimes things are hard to articulate in words, but with music we can."



Gatherings and Grace to Grow

The event of the month:

Yes, **Katherine Christian Convention** was the highlight for many Christian communities in the Territory. From 28th to 30th April, people travelled with anticipation from all directions. They included some church and mission groups from New South Wales and Victoria who volunteered to set up, collect registrations and manage the food. Many camped in tents at Katherine Show Ground, and other places

Unfortunately some from communities like Numbulwar and the Central Desert areas missed out due to flooded roads or no means to get there. The new Plain English Version (PEV, -you can get the app) Mini Bible was launched. We have already been using it in the Detention and Rehab Centres and found it very useful for multi-lingual groups. It has similar grammatical structures and terms to Aboriginal languages and is more user friendly for people from oral cultures with a first language other than English.

Overall the Convention was a special time of worship, teaching and fellowship as well as catching up with communities and church leaders from all over the Territory and beyond.

These included referrals of people who live at Kunbarlanja, Ngukurr and Numbulwar.

Miriam Numamurdirdi has now joined us again to visit patients in hospital.

Her knowledge of networks, families and culture teaches us and takes us much further than we can ever manage on our own. We are thankful to God for her contribution.

One interesting request from a friend in Darwin, was for her sister- a patient, to be taken out to a public place to cook some kangaroo tails on a BBQ! However, this patient was about to have a baby when we arrived, so that wasn't possible!

The mental health ward is usually hard to access, but we were asked to visit one patient. He was having his 20th Birthday on Mother's Day. So with his mother, we gained access to go in with a cake for her son. The whole ward turned up eagerly for a party for the young man, another patient and for the mothers.

Unknown to us, this had been pre-arranged by one of the staff! 'God im gudbala'.

For the month of August we will collect dishwashing liquid. Please keep this much needed item in mind when you do your weekly shop and bring them to the donation box in the narthex for distribution.




